French classes have been busy!

During the first class of every month, we do "calendrier" and review the months of the year (janvier, fevrier, mars, avril, mai, juin, juillet, aout, septembre, octobre, novembre, decembre) with emphasis on the current month and the holidays which fall during that month. In "novembre" all French students have learned vocabulary and have done activities associated with "Jour du Souvenir" (Remembrance Day). Please note that the months in French are never capitalized.

Casa students are learning some French vocabulary words for fruits and vegetables. Here are some of the words they are learning: une banane (a banana), une pomme (an apple), une orange (an orange), des raisins (some grapes), des fraises (some strawberries), une carotte (a carrot), du celeri (some celery), une pomme de terre (a potato), une tomate (a tomato), and du maïs (some corn).

Lower Elementary students are learning vocabulary and doing activities around food. They are learning some new French words from all five food groups. On the last class on the month Lower Elementary and Upper Elementary combine to participate in French games.

What is Peace Education?

Dr. Montessori proposed that we could ensure world peace by producing children who are independent, secure and at peace with themselves. She was a powerful peace advocate in Europe who focused on children as the future world leaders

In the Montessori classroom community, cooperation rather than competition is encouraged. There is an attitude of respect for self, others and the environment that is modeled by the teacher. Children are actively taught the skills of peacemaking. Conflict resolutions skills are learned and practiced. Classrooms have "peace corners" where children can go alone to quiet themselves or with a friend to work out a problem.
